Lt. Norman Norland of the field artillery battalion of the 108th wrote his wife on Dec. 26 from an undisclosed point. He said he was uninjured, not sick and had enjoyed a turkey dinner on Christmas day.

Mrs. Norland who lives at 2236 Elm street, also received a cabled Christmas greeting from her husband, but does not know whether or not it was ordered by him before the battle started.

Reporting from Twenty-first Army Group headquarters, Montgomery singled out the American 106th Infantry division, the Second and Seventh Armored divisions and Sard and 101st Airborne divisions as doing a great job in meeting the German counter-offensive on the Belgian front.

So far as known here, if was
