

MORE IN 106TH LISTED MISSING IN NAZI PUSH

Sgt. Weaver, Son of Mrs. J. E. Wilkerson, Unreported Since Dec. 16.

CHAPLAIN MOORE IS LOST

Nephew of Kennedys Also Among Division's Casualties from State.

Three more members of the 106th Infantry division, most recent division to train at Camp Atterbury, were learned here today to be listed as missing action on the Western front.

Casualty messages also have been pouring into other Indiana towns, listing members of the 106th Division as missing in action. Seven Indianapolis members of the division were listed missing in announcements Sunday and today.

Because of conditions on the Western front at the time of the German break-through, however, there is good reason to believe that a higher percentage than usual of these men will be found to be prisoners of the Germans or will rejoin their outfits after having been separated during the confusion of the German attack.

Wesley Weaver Missing.

Tech. Sgt. Wesley A. Weaver, a member of the 106th Infantry division, has been listed as missing in action on the Western front since Dec. 16, according to word received here by his mother, Mrs. James E. Wilkerson of 705 Hughes street, East Columbus.

Sergeant Weaver entered the Army Jan. 3, 1941, at Atlanta, Ga., and his wife and 18-month-old daughter are residing at Brunswick, Ga. He was stationed at Fort Jackson, S. C., and at Camp Forrest, Tenn., for more than three years and moved to Camp Atterbury last March with the 106th Division.

Mrs. Weaver and daughter resided here while he was stationed at Atterbury.

Chaplain Moore Missing.

Chaplain Mark W. Moore, Nazarene minister with the 106th Infantry division, has been listed as missing on the Western front. It was learned Sunday by the Rev. and Mrs. Ralph Ahlemann of this city.

Word that he had been listed missing was received by the local residents through a telegram from his wife, who with their 3-year-old son reside with a sister at Huntington. Their home is at Waco, Tex.

Chaplain Moore had spoken before the congregation of the local Church of the Nazarene, of which the Rev. Ahlemann is pastor. Chaplain Moore was pastor of First Nazarene church at Waco before entering service.

While he was stationed at Camp Atterbury with the 106th, Chaplain Moore and family resided at Edinburg. While here, Chaplain Moore conducted memorial services held for Russell Henderson, local soldier, who was killed in action in Italy.

Nephew Is Missing.

Pfc. Carlos S. Long, 36, of Shelby county, a nephew of Mrs. M. G. Kennedy, this city, has been reported missing in action with the 106th Division since Dec. 21.

Pfc. Long was employed at Camp Atterbury and resided with the Kennedys while working there. Following his induction about a year ago, he was assigned to the 106th and was stationed at Atterbury while the division was in training there.

The message was received by his wife, Mrs. Betty Long. She and their two children are living at Gwynesville with Pfc. Long's mother, Mrs. Hazel Long, who is a sister of Mrs. Kennedy.

Another Shelby county man, Pfc. Elmer G. Fogie, 25, who was in
