Wayne Long Discharged.
Staff Sgt. Wayne F. Long, one of the local national guardsmen who left here in January, 1941, for start of federal service, was expected to arrive home at Grammer Monday night after receiving a discharge through Atterbury.

He arrived at Atterbury Thursday from the Pacific, having last been stationed on Luzon. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. George Long of Grammer.

Long went to Camp Shelby and was then transferred out of the 38th Division. He has been serving with the 131st Engineers, went overseas in October, 1942, landing in New Caledonia. He was then on Guadalcanal in New Georgia, Munda, Bougainville and Luzon.

Former Prisoner Discharged.
Pvt. Raymond Shown of 1414 Cottage avenue husband of a local woman and a former prisoner of the Germans, received a discharge Saturday through Camp Atterbury with 123 points.

Shown was a member of the 106th Division and was captured in the Battle of the Bulge last December. He was liberated in April.

After he returned to the United States, he and the former Miss Ruby Morris of Columbus were married in July. They had met while he was first stationed at Atterbury in training with the 106th Division.

Shown was a member of Cannon company of the 42nd Infantry, 106th Division. His home is at Owensboro, Ky. He holds the EAME theater ribbon with two battle stars, the American Theater ribbon, American Defense Service medal and Good Conduct ribbon.

James Ogilvie Released.
Staff Sgt. James Ogilvie arrived here Monday night after receiving a discharge Saturday at Camp Bowie, Tex., where he had been stationed recently after overseas service.

Mrs. Ogilvie and their two daughters reside at 436 Franklin street. Ogilvie is a son of James P. Ogilvie of Edinburg route 2 and formerly was employed by Cummins Engine company.

He had 84 points. A member of Service battery, 77th Artillery Field Artillery battalion with Patton's Third army, Ogilvie took part in four campaigns and holds the Verdun medal.

He went overseas in July, 1944, and arrived back in the States last July. After being home on a 30-day leave he was assigned to Camp Bowie. He has the ETO theater ribbon with four battle stars and the Good Conduct ribbon. Ogilvie entered service April 22, 1941.

DeSpain Has 91 Points.
Pfc. Deibert G. DeSpain, son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew DeSpain, near Nortonsburg, received a discharge Sunday through Camp Atterbury. He had 91 points.

A member of the medical detachment of the 524th Separate Coast Artillery battalion, DeSpain took part in five campaigns, the Rhineland, Naples-Foggia, Rome-Arno, Southern France and Central Europe. He arrived back in the United States last week.

DeSpain spent 30 months in North Africa, Italy, France and Germany. He entered service Nov. 11, 1942, and has the EAME theater ribbon with five stars, the Arrowhead award and Good Conduct ribbon.

James H. Grow Home.
James Harvey Grow, a veteran of the Regular Navy, is home after receiving a discharge through the Great Lakes station last Thursday.

He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Grow of 138 Franklin street and a brother of Donald Grow who was injured in an accident north of Columbus Monday night. Another brother, Hiram E. Grow, received a discharge from the Army Sept. 8.

James Grow enlisted in the Navy at March 12, 1939. A boatswain's mate he served with the Pacific fleet and was based in the Canal zone for 40 months. He visited home in May, 1944, for the first time since enlisting. He was stationed at Norfolk, Va., prior to being transferred to the Great Lakes last May.

Easterday Released.

Tech. 4 John McLeod of Bedford, formerly of Columbus, has returned to civilian life after almost four years in the Army, mostly in the Pacific. He served as a combat reporter for the Yank, official Army publication. He plans to return to newspaper work after taking a rest.

The former Bedford high school basketball star is the son of Mr. and Mrs. D. G. McLeod, who formerly lived at 128 Union street, this city, and a brother of Mrs. E. F. Higgins, whose husband was contacted with the J. C. Penney store here until he also entered the service.

Entering the Army in November, 1941, Sergeant McLeod was given infantry training at Camp Wheeler, Ga., then sent to Australia. He later served in New Guinea, New Britain and the Philippines. He married an Australian girl, who is expected to join him within a few months.

Rushak on Terminal Leave.
Lt. Donovan Rushak, a veteran of the Canadian and U. S. air forces, is on terminal leave of the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Rushak, at Edinburg, and will receive a discharge from the Army on Nov. 15.

Lieutenant Rushak was held a prisoner by the Germans for 18 months after the plane on which he was the bombardier was shot down over Berlin. He was liberated May 18. He recently returned from Miami Beach, Fla., where he was sent for recuperation.

He joined the Royal Canadian Air force in 1941 and served overseas with it for nine months, after which he was transferred to the U. S. Eighth Air force.

He wears the Air medal, Purple heart, E. T. O. ribbon, British star, and Canadian Volunteer Service medal with Maple Leaf cluster.

ARGENTINE UPRISING CRUSHED BY FARRELL
Buenos Aires, Sept. 25 (AP)—An attempted revolution against the Farrell-Peron government of Argentina with the arrest of ex-President Gen. Arturo Rawson and a co-leader of the Army's anti-government faction.

A government communique said Rawson and Gen. Oswaldo Martin had been arrested by loyal Army units in Cordoba, 400 miles inland from the capital, "for inciting rebellion."

Government spokesmen said the rebellion had been suppressed "and that the situation everywhere was completely normal and tranquil."

Involuntary Manslaughter Charged in Woman's Death
Indianapolis, Sept. 25 (UP)—Charles Brown, 31, Acton, was charged with involuntary manslaughter in connection with the death of Mrs. Daisy Irene Hubbia, 47.

Witnesses said they saw Mrs. Hubbia fall to the road after a truck passed at high speed. Brown was accused of being the driver of the truck.

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
