First of Three Johnson County USO Units, Edinburg Club, Is Closed; Others End Soon

The first of Johnson county's three service men's clubs—the Edinburg USO—was closed today, and dates for the closing of the other two were announced. The Jefferson Street club of Franklin will terminate activities April 30, the King Street unit on June 30.

The Edinburg Youth Foundation has purchased the entire stock of equipment at the club, and it will be used in the proposed new youth center or sold to other organizations.

Commencing its activities in November, 1942, the Edinburg USO occupied quarters in the Sconce building until March, 1943. At that time a need for larger quarters prompted a transfer to the present site in the Kellams Garage building.

It was originally hoped that the government would provide a building through the Federal Security Administration and the city deeded land for this purpose in the heart of town. However, the matter was not culminated and the Kellams Garage became the permanent site.

In August, 1944, increased needs made it necessary to enlarge the room accommodations in the building and a new lease was drawn with the owners to take over the entire structure. Complete renovations were accomplished and USO expenses

Loui Zeppenfeld, 73 years of age, died at Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis at 5 o'clock Monday morning after an illness of three weeks. His condition became critical a week ago and Saturday he was removed to the hospital.

Services will be held from the Vandivier funeral home Wednesday morning at 10:30 o'clock with the Rev. Howard Stone, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, in charge of the rites. Burial will be in Greenlawn cemetery.

Mr. Zeppenfeld was born January 27, 1873, in Franklin on West street, where he resided at the time of his death. He was the son of Ernest and Elizabeth Zeppenfeld. He attended the Franklin schools and was a graduate of the high school here. He was a member of the First Presbyterian church.
